
**PRESENTATION OF THE BLESSED VIRGIN MARY**

According to the Protevangelium of James as well as the *Golden Legend*, Mary was presented in the Temple at the age of three to carry out a promise that her parents, Anna and Joachim, made offering Mary to God when Anna was childless.

Though it cannot be proven historically, Mary's presentation

has an important theological purpose. It continues the impact of the feasts of the Immaculate Conception (December 8) and of the birth of Mary (September 8). It emphasizes that the holiness conferred on Mary from the beginning of her life on earth continued through her early childhood and beyond.

This feast came into being with the dedication of the New Church of Saint Mary in Jerusalem in 543 and has been celebrated in the East since the 6th century. It was introduced to the West only in the 14th century; it has been preserved as a memorial in the new calendar. In art, the scene shows Mary as a child climbing the steps of the Temple and being welcomed by the Priest.





## FEAST OF ST. LEO THE GREAT

November 10 is the feast day of our Patron Saint, Saint Leo the Great. Also known as Pope Saint Leo I, he was born into a Roman aristocratic family around 400 and he died in 461. His response to the call of the Lord transformed him into one of the greatest popes of Christian history. In fact, he was the first pope to be given the title "the Great." Details pertaining to Leo's place of birth are not known, but it is believed his ancestors come from Tuscany. He was still a deacon when he was elected pope. Pope Leo was the first pope to call himself the successor to St. Peter. Pope Leo was responsible for important changes in the Church year. He added new feasts and placed greater importance on the celebration of Christmas. He replaced pagan holidays with Christian celebrations and began the practice of fasting during certain Church seasons.



Heresies, or false teachings, were another area of concern for Pope Leo. He wrote letters to the bishops to help them better understand the true teachings of the Church that have come down to us from the Apostles; he gave sermons correcting false teachings, and he even called an important Church meeting to deal with confusion caused by false teachings. St. Leo the Great is also responsible for helping people understand the meaning of the Incarnation, God becoming man in Jesus. For his great gift of teaching, Pope Leo has been given the title of Doctor of the Church.

Pope Leo was also a peacemaker. He personally convinced the Huns to turn back from their planned invasion of Rome. Although the warring tribe called the Vandals did invade Rome, St. Leo was able to keep them from burning and looting the city. St. Leo is best known for being a good shepherd and pastor for all the people of the Church, from the bishops to the poor who begged for food on the streets of Rome. He reached out to the poor and neglected people of the world and urged the bishops to do the same. His homilies helped people know how to live their faith because they were full of practical advice. Nearly 100 sermons and 150 letters of St. Leo I have been preserved; one of them is still, to this day, used in the Office of Readings on Christmas. In 1754, Pope Benedict XIV proclaimed St. Leo I a Doctor of the Church.
