

## It Will Happen Again

Isaiah promised a return from the exile in Babylon. For 70 years the exiles clung to that hope. With the Edict of Cyrus, the hope was realized, and the exile ended. In our first reading this weekend, Isaiah continues to resort to poetry, the only way to come close to capturing the joy the return will hold. Second and third Isaiah, as well as some of the psalms, tell and retell the joy of God's intervention and the journey back to the homeland. But the point is not to simply recount history. It is a holy word of encouragement. This is what God has done and who God is for His people. As God led the exiles on the journey home, God can lead us now out of whatever exile we face, and bring us home. When praying with passages like this, remember its not just about the past, it is about God's wonders today as well. Even today, there are refugees who are blessed with a return to their physical home. Coming home to ourselves is a journey we all can experience through grace. Let the reading speak to that return for you!

#### It Takes Patience

It does take patience to farm, to garden. Anything we plant will grow at its own rate. Learn from farmers, James tells us. The journey of faith also takes place at God's rate, not ours. The farmer knows if a plant is forced to grow too quickly, it will not be hardy. It will also be less resistant to disease and insects. So too faith. Slow, patient, steady progress – that's what James would counsel.

#### Picture It

His preaching was powerful. He didn't pull punches. He called out sin, no matter who the sinner was. That didn't sit well with the powers that be, and it landed John the Baptist in jail, as we hear in the opening of our Gospel this weekend. Prison is not an easy place to hold on to hope. Discouragement can set in easily, along with second guessing. Imagine John's spirit when the word came back – the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the dead raised and the poor have the good news preached to them. The Messiah has come! He is among us! As you spend time with this Gospel, don't forget – there is more than one kind of blindness, there are various ways to be lame or hard of hearing, and death can of course be physical, but at can also be emotional or spiritual. None of these are beyond Jesus' power to save!

# Eucharistic Miracles of the World "To always be close to Jesus, that's my life plan" ~Carlo Acutis (5/3/91-10/12/06)

Carlo Acutis was born in 1991, he and his parents lived most of their lives in Milan, Italy. From a very early age, family members noticed that there was something 'special' about this child. Upon making his First Communion at age 7 Carlo exhibited a strong desire to be in the presence of Jesus in the Tabernacle. At age 11 Carlo was compelled to create a website chronicling all the eucharistic miracles, that had ever been approved by the church. Carlo contracted leukemia and died on October 12, 2006 at the age of 15. Despite his illness, Carlo never wavered in his faith and devotion to the Eucharist. Carlo wished to encourage others to also lead this Christ-like life.



#### WHY WILL WE CONTINUE TO MARCH?

Even with the wonderful blessing of Roe v. Wade being overturned, which allows more freedom at the state level to enact pro-life laws, the necessary work to build a culture of life in the United States of America is not finished. Rather, it is focused differently. Sadly, the number of abortions annually is still well over 900,000 each year, and that number is expected to decrease only by roughly 200,000 each year in a post-Roe America. Many national legislative battles loom, including even keeping longstanding Hyde protections, which limit government funding for abortion on annual appropriation bills. The Hyde Amendment has saved over 2 million lives and is arguably the most impactful pro-life policy in our nation's history, but now cannot be taken for granted. Last, our most important work is changing hearts and minds. The goal of the national March for Life is to not only change laws at the state and federal level, but to change the culture to ultimately make abortion unthinkable.
